RECOMMENDATION:

a) The Committee select a Chair and Vice Chair of the Broadband Committee.

b) Make certain findings, including but not limited to, meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health or safety of attendees, as set forth in Resolution 2021-01 which defines the provisions of AB361 and authorizes remote teleconference meetings for the next thirty (30) days of the initial or subsequent resolution to continue to allow the Broadband Committee to meet remotely via teleconference, as allowed under AB361 and in compliance with the Brown Act Provisions for the period November 18, 2021 to December 18, 2021.

BACKGROUND:

Governor Newsom declared a State of Emergency on March 4, 2020 in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. Executive Order N-29-20, signed on March 17, 2020, suspended certain requirements of the Brown Act by granting public agencies the ability to conduct meetings via teleconference or electronic means while providing member of the public options to observe and provide public comment during the course of the meeting without physically attending. Executive Order N-08-21, rescinded these temporary Brown Act measures effective September 30, 2021.

Whereas, assembly Bill 361 was passed on September 16, 2021, and is effective from October 1, 2021 until January 1, 2024, providing local agencies the ability to meet remotely during proclaimed state emergencies as defined in CA GOVT Code 8625, as defined when

state officials have imposed or recommended measures to promote social distancing. Consistent with the requirements of AB 361, the District or Committee must make certain findings, which are set forth in Resolution 2021-01, defining the provisions of AB361 which defines the provisions of AB 361 and authorized remote teleconference meetings for the next thirty (30) days. A subsequent resolution must be adopted no later than thirty (30) days of adoption of the initial or subsequent resolution to continue to allow the District or Committee to meet remotely via teleconference.

Resolution No. 2021 - 01

A Resolution of the Broadband Committee of the Truckee Donner Public Utility District Authorizing Remote Teleconference Meetings of the Broadband Committee for the Period of November 18, 2021 to December 18, 2021 pursuant to the Brown Act Provisions and AB361

WHEREAS, the Truckee Donner Public Utility District is committed to preserving and nurturing the public access and participation in meetings of the District; and

WHEREAS, all meetings of the District's legislative bodies are open and public, as required by the Ralph M. Brown Act (Cal. Gov. Code 54950 et all), so that any member of the public may attend, participate, and watch the District's legislative bodies conduct their business; and

WHEREAS, the Brown Act, Government Code section 54953(e), makes provisions for remote teleconferencing participation in meetings by members of a legislative body, without compliance with the requirements of Government Code section 54953(b)(3), subject to the existence of certain conditions; and

WHEREAS, a required condition is that a state of emergency is declared by the Governor pursuant to Government Code section 8625, proclaiming the existence of conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property within the state caused by conditions as described in Government Code section 8558; and

WHEREAS, a proclamation is made when there is an actual incident, threat of disaster, or extreme peril to the safety of persons and property within the jurisdictions that are within the District's boundaries, caused by natural, technological, or human-caused disasters; and

WHEREAS, it is further required that state or local officials have imposed or recommended measures to promote social distancing, or the legislative body meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health and safety of attendees; and

WHEREAS, such conditions now exist in the District, specifically, the State of Emergency declared by Governor Newsom on March 4, 202, due to COVID-19 and

WHEREAS, the Broadband does hereby find that the increase in SARS-CoV-2 Delta Variant has caused, and will continue to cause, conditions of peril to the safety of persons within the District that are likely to be beyond the control of services, personnel, equipment, and facilities of the District, and desires to proclaim a local emergency and ratify the proclamation of state of emergency by the Governor of the State of California; and

WHEREAS, as a consequence of the local emergency, the Broadband Committee does hereby find that the Broadband Committee shall conduct their meetings without compliance with paragraph (3) of subdivision (b) of Government Code section 54953, as authorized by subdivision (e) of section 54953, and that such legislative bodies shall comply with the requirements to provide the public with access to the meetings as prescribed in paragraph (2) of subdivision (e) of section 54953; and

WHEREAS, the Broadband Committee enacts virtual meeting protocols on November 18, 2021, which include options for public participation.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BROADBAND COMMITTEE OF THE TRUCKEE DONNER PUBLIC UTILITY DISTRICT THAT:

- 1. <u>Recitals</u>. The Recitals set forth above are true and correct and are incorporated into this Resolution by this reference.
- 2. <u>Ratification of Governor's Proclamation of a State of Emergency</u>. The Broadband Committee hereby ratifies the Governor of the State of California's Proclamation of State of Emergency, effective as of its issuance date of March 4, 2020.
- 3. Remote Teleconference Meetings. The Broadband Committee is hereby authorized and directed to take all actions necessary to carry out the intent and purpose of this Resolution including, conducting open and public meetings in accordance with Government Code section 54953(e) and other applicable provisions of the Brown Act.
- 4. <u>Effective Date of Resolution</u>. This Resolution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption and shall be effective until the earlier of (i) December 18, 2021, or such time the Broadband Committee adopts a subsequent resolution in accordance with Government Code section 54953(e)(3) to extend the time with paragraph (3) of subdivision (b) of section 54953.








REGIONAL UNMET NEED - BY COHORT




